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The event NAGC Parent Day is held in conjunction with the NAGC Annual Convention, the largest and most informative national conference devoted to classroom innovation, gifted education, and gifted learners. You will attend NAGC Convention events, sessions, and visit the Exhibit Hall (9 am - 4:30 pm) in the Hilton and the Baltimore Convention Center. Lunch is not included, but available for purchase in the Exhibit Hall.

Location Check in at NAGC Convention Registration begins at 7:00 am at the Baltimore Convention Center, 300 level, Pratt Street Lobby. Breakfast (7:30 am) and the opening session (8:00 am) is in the Hilton Baltimore Holiday Ballrooms 4/5. Hotel rooms may be available via the Baltimore/NAGC Housing Bureau, call 800-282-6631. Check out www.nagc.org for more details.

Registration Register in advance online or by mail, by October 30. After that date, you must register onsite. Payment in full is expected at time of registration. Your registration fee will include a one-year NAGC parent associate membership and MCGATE membership.

Check-In NAGC Parent Day attendees should arrive and check-in at NAGC Registration in the Baltimore Convention Center no later than 7:30 am.

Please plan to arrive early to pick up your badge/s and program book (one book per family) and head to the Hilton for a light breakfast and your opening session. Plus, you'll want to have time to visit with other parents and resource specialists!

NAGC does not provide free parking. Parking is not included in your registration fee. Paid parking facilities are located nearby. The most current information will be provided closer to November. A 5K race is planned in downtown Baltimore on November 15, so allow sufficient time to drive around to find the Hilton and parking.

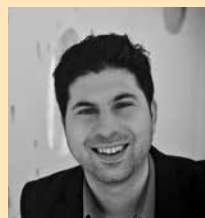
